"For nothing will be impossible with God" Luke 1:37

Mary is astonished when the angel Gabriel informs her that she will conceive and bear a son. "How can this be," she asks, "since I am a virgin?" Mary is perplexed by the conflict between "the facts" as she understands them and the promises of God. Mary is not the only woman in the Bible to bear a child in what seemed to be impossible circumstances. Sarah, Abraham's wife, was old and childless. Yet, in fulfillment of God's promise, Sarah gave birth to Isaac. Rachel was grieved that she bore Jacob no children. But God remembered Rachel, and she gave birth to Joseph. Vexed over her childlessness, Hannah prayed and asked God for a son. The Lord heard her prayer, and she gave birth to the prophet and judge, Samuel. Elizabeth and her husband Zechariah were old and without children. But God promised Zechariah that Elizabeth would bear a son, and she gave birth to John the Baptist. Giving so -called "barren women" the children they long for, seems to be one of God's favorite "surprises" in Scripture!

God's miraculous work in the lives of these Old Testament saints foreshadows the even more astonishing work of God that causes Mary to conceive Jesus Christ. When Mary asks Gabriel, "How can this be," he speaks mysteriously of the Holy Spirit and the power of the Most High, but he sums it all up by saying, "For nothing will be impossible with God."

Sometimes our lives seem barren. We may seem to miss out on the joys that come so easily to others. We may seem to have more than our share of pain and suffering. The world around us can also seem desolate and bleak, as we follow news stories of war, violence, disease, and injustice. We hear the promises of God at worship and in Scripture, and they sound wonderful. But they can also seem so at odds with our lives or the world around us, that we find ourselves asking, "How can this be?"



Advent is a time when we remember that with God, nothing is impossible. The so-called "facts" we observe about our lives and the world are one thing, but the power of God is truly something else. 2000 years ago, the Son of God took on human flesh from a virgin by the power of the Holy Spirit. In his living, dying, and rising, he showed us that God's love is more powerful than death and suffering. Indeed, Christ has promised to come again, and is making all things new even now (Revelation 21:5, 22:20). Trusting the promises of God, we have real hope that we, and the world around us, are being made new.

Prayer: Lord Jesus, take the barren regions of my life and make them bear fruit by your transforming, creative power. I trust you to bless me. Keep me ever mindful that with you, nothing is impossible. Amen.

"For nothing will be impossible with God."

Luke 1:37

I am reminded daily that I (and all of us) am created in God's image. We are not here by accident. The Bible tells us in Psalm 139.13 that "we were knit together in our mother's womb". God planned us long before we came into being. He knows everything about us, even down to the number of hairs on our head (Matthew 10:30). We have already been given the image of the one to emulate.

God has key positions for all of us within His divine purpose. Some of us may have spent a lifetime chasing after dreams that are impossible because we failed to believe our creator has better plans for us. Dream Big! What we may see as impossible, God sees as possible.

In the Bible, there are over 7,000 promises from God. These are God's promises to us in all areas of our lives. In times of happiness, sadness, joy, anger, loneliness, financial difficulty, or wondering what our future may hold for us, why do we tend to turn away from God instead of turning towards Him? God knows us better than anyone and wants to share in every aspect of our lives. Turn to the One who created you in His image. To achieve all that God has given us the opportunity to do, we must be willing and ready to meet the challenges. God tells us, "Nothing is impossible".



I think of Elizabeth, known as "the barren one", who wanted a child all of her life, but never could conceive. She and Zachariah were faithful to God and obedient to Him. Then, when Elizabeth and Zachariah were up in years, the angel Gabriel appeared to Zachariah and told him Elizabeth would conceive and have a child. Because he did not believe the message, Gabriel told Zachariah he would not be able to speak until these things took place. The angel said these things will be fulfilled in their proper time. In Luke 1:25, Elizabeth says, "God has shown his favor and will take away my disgrace among people."

I think the key point here to think about is that God already knew what was in Elizabeth's heart and had obedience from both of them, but wanted them to believe it was possible. We also must remind ourselves that because something does not happen exactly when we want it to, it does not mean it is impossible. It is all in God's great

timing. 272 times in the Bible, the word "Believe" is used. God not only wants us to read his promises, but we must put our faith into action and believe them.

In the same way, an angel appeared to Mary and told her she would conceive and give birth to a son and he shall be called Jesus. Like Mary, our response should not be with skepticism, laughter or doubt but with a willing spirit.

Let us remember that reading God's promises is important, but as Mary did, and as it happened for Elizabeth, let us also believe. The American Standard Version says it this way. *"For no word from God shall be void of POWER."*

<u>Prayer</u>: Most Gracious and loving God, creator of all things, you have given us the perfect example to live by in life. You are all knowing and have the perfect plan for all of us. In reading your word, help me to remember the image of the one who created me. Take all doubt from me and help me to accept that you want the very best for me. I pray for a willing spirit to believe and accept with open arms the generous opportunities you bring forth to me on a daily basis. I believe, Lord. Help my unbelief.

Mary knew her son was the Son of God. She was told that he would be great and there would be no end to his Kingdom. Mary knew that she held something super precious. But she had not been given the knowledge of all the steps in his future. She had not

been told of what his childhood would look like. She had not been told of the individual miracles he would perform or of the pride and the heartache she would experience during his relatively short life.

Mary had a baby. She held that baby, and loved that baby, and kissed that baby, and wondered about his future – just as all mothers do.

Most of our Christmas Hymns are written either from the perspective

of those awaiting, anticipating, and preparing for the birth of Jesus, or they are written from the observations and experiences of those who have heard of the birth of the baby Jesus. These hymns usually tell

the story of the birth and are joyful and celebratory. But, until Clay Aiken wrote the lyrics to "Mary Did You Know?", I never felt as if I was right there, seeing Mary hold her baby and, perhaps, being able to talk with her. It touches me deeply.

Prayer: Dearest Lord Jesus, your mother, Mary, loved you so much. As you bestow even greater love on all of humanity, please guide us to share your love with all we meet. Amen


The Advent/Christmas season is not conducive to being still. There's decorating to be done, gifts to purchase, church services to rehearse for or attend, family dinners to prepare, parties for the office/social groups/neighborhood to attend, charities to donate to, school events, concerts and ballets to attend, etc., etc. WHO HAS TIME TO BE STILL??

So, what does "be still" mean, I wondered? I googled the definition of "still". As a noun, the word means "deep silence and calm". As an adjective, it means "not moving or making a sound".

I tried to think of times I might have experienced stillness. I remembered the stillness outside the church at midnight on Christmas Eve when we lived in Michigan. Snow would have fallen, and not a sound could be heard. I remembered how still it was in the middle of the night as I rocked one of my babies. I recalled how still the house was recently when the power went out for over an hour.

At the church retreat in September, 2014, I learned to be still during the sitting yoga class. I listened as Ed Keelen taught us about Centering Prayer at the same retreat. In Centering Pray-





As I continued to consider this verse, I realized that "being still" was not an optional request from God, but a command from God. He did not say "if you have a few moments, please sit down and be still". God said, "Be still, and know that I am God". Just like our relationships with family and friends, knowing God requires that we spend time with Him. How well we know God, depends on how much time we spend with Him. We must take the time to "be still". We must learn to "be still". Nothing on the to-do list is more important than time spent learning to know that He is God.

The Psalm further says when we know that He is God, He will be exalted among the nations, He will be exalted in the earth. Exalt means to elevate, glorify, praise, honor. The Westminster Catechism says that "man's chief end is to glorify God, and to enjoy Him forever". We must spend time with God in order to exalt Him.

God gave us His Son, the greatest gift we can ever receive. Let's spend time with God this Advent season and always.

"Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ." - Galatians 6:2

Prior to sitting down to write this, I had a subject in mind but was unsure how to present it. The above verse captures exactly what I would like to relate to my fellow members of Seven Oaks Presbyterian Church.

Throughout the year, the church sponsors many events which reach out to the children and families in this immediate area. Some of these programs are reduced cost or free tuition at the SOPC Preschool, spring and fall fun/learning events for the children in the neighborhood, and a variety of weekly events for various age groups. There is a continuing support to the Seven Oaks Elementary School with a Teacher Appreciation Breakfast, the supply of school materials, and with the Reading Buddies and Mentor Programs which help develop children's reading and social skills. Seven Oaks Elementary School has the highest rate of children receiving free or reduced cost meals in the Richland Lexington 5 School District. This number is approximately 75% of the children enrolled at the school. Yes that's correct, 75% is a very difficult statistic to imagine happening right here in our own neighborhood.

The nutritional needs of these children are satisfied 5 days per week at the school with breakfasts, lunches and after school snacks. But, during the weekend, many of these children are left alone at home with nothing to eat. Due to the generosity and caring of SOPC's support of what is called the "Snack Pack Program", a bag of 15 child friendly, easily prepared, food items is sent home each Friday with a number of the most needy children. Currently there are 24 children receiving these weekly food bags, but last year this number rose to about 45 by the end of the year. These children have been identified by their teachers or the Guidance Counselor as coming to school hungry each Monday morning. Not only does this augment or fulfill their dietary needs for the weekend, but it helps reduce illness and Monday morning visits to the School Nurse, as it provides them with a basis on which to concentrate and learn. As you can imagine, it's hard to listen to the teacher and concentrate on learning, if the growling from your stomach is louder than her voice. Subconsciously, it may even occur to them that somebody cares enough about them to provide this food package each weekend. This is good for their self esteem.

On several occasions at the local food drives to help support this program, I have been approached by people in their early 20's donating a grocery cart full of food with a statement like "When I was in high school this program supplied all I had to eat on the weekend and now I've got a job so I can give back a little". Those people are truly living the opening Bible verse above.

SOPC is a generous and caring congregation of people who always demonstrate compassion for those in need of assistance. The support of Seven Oaks Elementary School, and specifically the Snack Pack Program, is just one of the many ways that the members of SOPC are living this verse by "Bearing one another's burdens, and so fulfilling the law of Christ".

We tell our loved ones how much we love them, and we begin to make amends with those we have hurt.

The prophet Malachi, along with Isaiah, tells us of the coming of the Messiah long before we hear of the Christ Child's birth. The messenger is preparing the way by telling of the One to come. He sends John the Baptist to prepare the way; to warn and to build anticipation of the One who is coming.

This message is as appropriate for us today as it was for the people who walked the earth with Jesus. We are to prepare the way for the coming of the Christ Child, the anointed One. During this busy season when we are filling our time with parties, shopping, decorating and baking, take time to sit and listen. Pray and meditate on the story.



Think how it must have felt to be Elizabeth at her age, having a baby. Think about Mary and her conversation with Gabriel. Remember Joseph who so totally wanted to do the right thing. How he must have felt so very left out. Think of the shepherds hearing of the birth from an angel - and all that brightness! Scripture says the glory of the Lord shown all around them.

Meditate on these people and their thoughts and how it must have felt to be part of this great miracle. Let us put the miracle back in the coming days before our Savior was born. May we be like Mary and ponder all these things in our hearts.

<u>Prayer</u>: Dear God, our heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of your heavenly Son. Let his light shine upon us and in our hearts this season. Guide us to be your heavenly light for others who have yet to know the amazing story of the Messiah. Help us to prepare the way for his coming so all may have the joy that knowing Christ brings to us. Amen



Can you imagine! Pregnant and riding a donkey!! Heck I didn't even want to get in and out of the car when my children were being born.



Making music is one way I can act. I can sing, ring and play tunes proclaiming with the angels, "Gloria in excelsis Deo". I can sound songs telling the world there really is **joy**, because the Lord has come. I can make melodies pointing hearts to the manger, and giving voice to my praise and adoration of the Christ Child. Making music helps me be more than a hearer of the word, it propels me to be a doer.

God has given each one of us something we can do in this season as an act of loving response to the great gift we have received. Perhaps we can begin by doing as the shepherds did.

Matthew's story of the birth of Jesus is astonishing. First there is the engagement of Mary and Joseph, then Mary is with child, which sets Joseph on his heels and puts him in a no-win situation. He must make a difficult decision which could have no favorable outcome.

Then God sends an angel to explain this miracle to Joseph. The message of the angel, along with Joseph's faith in God, sets Joseph at ease. As the story unfolds, all is well with Joseph.

The angel declared to Joseph that Mary's child was conceived by the Holy Spirit and would be a son, revealing an important truth about Jesus – He is both God and human, taking on the limitations of humanity so He could live and die for the salvation of all who would believe in Him.

Joseph, as Jesus' earthly father did - as the fathers of today do – trained Jesus in the trade of carpentry, made sure Jesus had good spiritual training in Nazareth, and took the whole family on a yearly trip to Jerusalem for the Passover.

Advent is the season each year that helps to renew our faith in Christ's birth and our salvation. May the joyful excitement of this advent season revitalize our awareness of our faith and trust in Jesus as our Lord and Savior.

How do *you* get into the Christmas spirit? What does that phrase mean to you? For many of us, the answer has changed as we've grown and matured over the decades.

Childhood. "Better be good, boys. Santa Claus is coming!" We can focus our children on a simple version of the Christmas story, but chances are that visions of toys and Santa will still dance in their heads. At least that warning puts some emphasis on *being good* during this sacred season. For the Dillard boys, the admonition actually worked. We were sometimes good for as much as three hours on Christmas Eve.



Junior High. I liked to read <u>A Christmas Carol</u> by Charles Dickens every year during the holiday break from school. (OK, actually it was a condensed children's version.)

The classic story of Ebenezer Scrooge always put me in a Christ-mas mood and inspired me to be a better person. My 8th-grader's image of a better person was an affable, good-natured fellow with a twinkle in his eye like the reformed Mr. Scrooge. The type who generously bought huge turkeys for poor families.

Adulthood. One good way to prepare for Christmas is to reread Luke's familiar account of the birth of Jesus. Luke tells the beloved story in 20 short verses in Chapter Two.

The King James Version is still the favorite for many. You'll have to agree that "...on earth peace, good will toward men" has a better ring to it than "...on earth peace to men on whom his favor rests." For those who grew up with them, phrases like "shepherds abiding in the field" and "Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger" have a real resonance.



A Few Years Ago. It occurred to me several years ago that re-reading the story in Luke gave me the same good feeling as listening to that song "Christmas in Dixie." Both Luke and the record lyrics somehow made me imagine a warm, clear, peaceful night just like you might find in the South, even in December.

Is the fact that a person's feelings about Christmas could be summarized in a country music song, a sign that they needed to think a little more deeply?

Now. We've heard it all our lives. We know it intellectually, but take it all for granted. Christmas profoundly changed our understanding of God, the world, and our role in it! Before Christmas, God was a revered but remote figure for many people. Because of Christmas, the world can see, through Christ, what God is like. That he is kind. He shares and understands our emotions. He cares for us and loves us.

Time with family and friends can be a great holiday tradition. Remembering all the things that took place in Bethlehem that night is important. But what is the best way to get ready for Christmas, to prepare to celebrate the coming of Christ? Perhaps it is to look at the birth of Jesus with fresh eyes, as if we were just realizing for the first time how profoundly that event has changed our lives. Then we can ponder how that knowledge should impact the way we live each day, how we treat others and how much time we devote to God. And perhaps, most of all, to be grateful for God's precious gift.



Candlelight, angel light, firelight and star-glow, Shine on his cradle till breaking of dawn. Silent night, holy night, all is calm and all is bright, Angels are singing; the Christ child is born.



And why did this touch me so? John Rutter has a gift, there is no denying. But I think it was mainly because there I sat, large and round, just a few weeks before giving birth to my own special baby. Ken and I had so wanted children, but all of our prayers and medical attempts seemed futile. I had never felt so empty. But just as we began adoption proceedings, little Will announced his presence. All parents feel the miracle of having a baby, and all mothers who are lucky enough to be pregnant during Christmas time, relate in a special way to the story of Mary. But when parenthood seems just out of reach, that "surprise" baby is a miracle beyond all others. And John Rutter was right: There is no way to adequately express a mother's love, or the awe of hearing a baby's first cry. What a gift!

Prayer: God, here at Christmas time, help our wonder at the Christ Child's birth be renewed by remembering the amazing births of our own special babies: Children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews, and friends. And thank you for the music that touches our hearts and expresses the otherwise inexpressible.
